Buying Second-Hand, Pre-Loved & Used Locos Or Rolling Stock

Second-hand, pre-loved & used all mean much the same, of course. I always tend to think of "pre-loved" in terms of a teddy-bear or similar, and "used" in terms of a car where any dings and the odometer are there for all to see. Lacking in time and talent, I have bought a fair amount of second-hand models in my time and, having bought a few lemons, I am quite well qualified in the topic. However, there are numerous SARMA members who can provide technical information on your prospective purchase.

So, why buy second-hand? The first and most obvious reason is cost: you can usually buy two or more second-hand items for the same amount as a new item. The down side is that they may not perform as well as a new one. The other most common reason is that you simply can't buy new the model that you want. A combination of these two is the reason most of my collection of SAR rolling stock was bought second-hand.

The other consideration is why the item is being sold. It may be that the owner has died or has changed circumstances where he can no longer have a layout. Another possibility is that he is changing scale and/or prototype. In either of these situations, the model could be in reasonable condition. If the owner is doing an upgrade (e.g. selling off his old 830s or 930s) to a new model, the condition of the old models could be anything between reasonably serviceable to clapped out.

Maybe the reason for sale is that the model no longer runs satisfactorily or has physical damage or shoddy or incorrect paintwork or decals. While the latter should be fairly obvious, poor running can be harder to detect. Ideally, you need to see the model running in a layout type of environment. Unfortunately, this isn't always possible at the time of the sale. A run down a test track will, at least, tell you that it runs. Taking it through pointwork

with a load behind (if it's a loco or railcar) can tell a different story. If you only have the test track option (as is usually the case), you can apply a load with your finger – it doesn't take much expertise to differentiate between a healthy and unhealthy loco.

The main things to watch for with rollingstock are:

- Couplers check to see that they deflect freely and re-centre properly (especially if the coupler box is glued on).
- Wheels/axles/bearings check that each axle is not too sloppy or tight in its bearings and the wheels spin freely without wobble in either plane. Check that all wheels sit firmly on a flat surface. You might also want to check to see whether the wheels are metal or plastic. Check, also, to see whether the wheel tread is worn or the flanges are deep both indicators of an old and/or extensively run model.

For locos and railcars, all the above plus

- Coupling rods/valve gear check for tightness or excessive wear (badly worn coupling rods can jam and stop the loco moving more than one wheel revolution).
- Motor/gearbox check for smooth running without excessive noise.

Always assume that your purchase will have something wrong with it, so be prepared to do a little work or a clean and lubricate; hope that it doesn't need a major overhaul or is ready for the scrap bin. If you are in doubt (and even if you're not) try to get a second opinion from a more experienced modeller.

Finally, remember the old adage, **Let the buyer beware.** There are plenty of lemons out there – I can show you a few. It can be very difficult to get a seller to give you a refund on a faulty item.





Special Interest Groups (SIGs) & Email Protocol

A Special Interest Group is exactly what it says: a group of people who have a special interest in a particular topic. You could say that SARMA is a SIG and, if you interpreted SARMA as an association of modellers of South Australian Railways, you would be right. However, as we often have to tell people and, sometimes, have to remind our own members, it is an association of railway modellers based in South Australia. While many members have a particular interest in SAR and the trains which run or ran in South Australia, our constitution is quite clear in that our primary function is furthering the model railway hobby.

Many of our members model Victorian, U.S. and British railways. Any of these groups could form a SIG; maybe they have without telling anyone, or even without being aware that they have done so because it is very easy for a few people to form an informal group without realising it. They might simply exchange email addresses and seek and pass on information on their particular topic between themselves. Only if they wanted to solicit other members or undertake a major task like building a dedicated layout, would they think about forming a more formal SIG.

What sort of special interest would a group within SARMA have?

The most common topic is prototype. A SIG might be formed of people interested in railways of a particular country such as the U.S. or U.K. or a branch of these such as Union Pacific or Great Western. Another topic could be the narrow gauge railways of SA/NT, Victoria, Queensland or anywhere else in the world.

The next common topic is scale/gauge. O

scale, particularly On30, has a small, but growing following. British OO scale (which is close to HO) has a significant following in Australia although EM, P4 and OOn9 are rare to the best of my knowledge. S scale, too, has little following outside America although there is a SIG within AMRA in WA who use it, presumably as Sn3.5 running on 16.5mm track. N scale is steadily making ground as houses, blocks and sheds shrink. Australia embraces HOn3 and HOn3.5, and these are used to model the significant amount of narrow gauge around the country. You may not know that SARMA has several members who have HOn3 equipment and the club itself owns numerous locos and pieces of rolling stock.

The last SIG topic I will mention (I'm sure that there are others) is modelling non-mainstream periods prior to 1950 or even a lot earlier. NSW has a strong following modelling the early years and most other states have a steadily increasing interest in their railway heritage.

That brings us to one of the reasons to form or join a SIG. If you want to model a nonmainstream prototype and/or in a nonmainstream scale, you lose the advantage of manufacturing in economic quantity. You may have heard about groups of early SARMA members making batches of SAR models and later making moulds from a oneoff model and casting parts or complete models. Peter Ziegler joined the club around this time and BGB was born. Nowadays, with advances in moulding materials, relatively easy to make batches of models or parts - once you've made a good master, of course. Many attendees at Wednesday worknights will have seen Hugh Williams produce a plastic kit before their very eyes.

One obvious question is "Why should a group formalise their members into a recognised SIG?" I find that a bit hard to answer. If the group are comfortable with the members they have and don't want to include any more except by invitation, and if they want no support from or input into the club as a whole, then there is no apparent reason. But if they wish to foster interest in their particular topic and, perhaps, make it an attraction for prospective members, then the greater visibility of a recognised SIG has advantages. It also means that, if other members come across material pertaining to the SIG topic, they can forward it to a representative of the group. I like to think that so many of our members take some sort of interest in railway systems other than SAR in HO 16.5mm (particularly U.S., gauge Victorian, Commonwealth and SA narrow gauge), that forming an SIG would be unnecessary and much of the communication could go into the Buffer Stop – I'm sure it would be welcomed.

Perhaps, if the formation of a SIG was reserved for groups who want to undertake a significant project and are looking for sponsorship from the club, we could provide a list of members with any contact details they are comfortable with showing, plus their particular interests. Then any member discovering or requiring information on, for instance, circus trains, could contact the listed member. I would like feedback on this idea.

Email Protocol:

One of the most effective means of communication nowadays is email. It can be used to convey data, pictures (still and moving) and sound to one or many recipients. It is the ideal communication medium for a group. However we do need to be careful what information we pass on with regard to

its size and details of people which are contained within the email. If a person that you are communicating with only has dial-up (yes, there are still a few), make sure that any attachment to them will not clog their system. When forwarding emails, ensure that you delete the previous recipients unless you specifically want to show the source. This is particularly important if there is a large distribution on it. Take the example of person A at work sending person B an email believing that only B will read it. Person B now sends it on to a whole group of friends without deleting person A's email address, and so it goes on. You could get A's identity email address distributed among hundreds or thousands and it could come back to bite the originator in the proverbial. They could face discipline or even lose their job over it.

For the same reason, if you send an email to unrelated people, ensure that you send it to undisclosed addressees or blind copies. This way, none of your recipients can identify each other.

It was once suggested that the contact details of all members be made available to all other members. Although a few clubs do this, the SARMA committee decided that they had no mandate to publish this information and one rotten apple could cause a very embarrassing situation. It is up to individuals to decide how public their contact details would be. You will find a list of committee members in the front of this magazine. If you want to contact a member whose email address or phone number you don't have, contact a committee member (preferably the secretary) who will forward a message to the individual to contact you or, at his discretion, provide the information that you need.
