7. Alistair Whibley visited Old Tailem Town and encouraged members to pay it a visit as there are quite a lot of railway related displays including plenty of rolling stock.

8. According to John Looker, the Northern Territory has also got a large amount of railway orientated sights to visit; in particular, Adelaide River and Darwin.

Show & tell:

Matt La Vista showed his N scale Bluebird kit bought at the last swapmeet. Also some Graham Farish coaches in N that he wants to change the couplers on, a massive American GG1 "with about a million bogies", made by Kato. He also had a 30 year old Kato C50 from Japan. After joining the N scale Society Matt showed us the members pack, full of "more information than I could possibly need". A series of American coaches that are destined to be repainted to look like the Spirit of Progress. There were also some books from the Oakwood Press like Cliff Railways of the British Isles and Fifty years of the West Sussex Fire Brigade. He also showed a book he bought but it is in French so he can only look at the pictures as well as a book on the Brookwood Necropolis. There was one last book that had pictures of unusual "Coffee Pot" railmotors.

Peter Pickering displayed his PSM (Ajin built) A2 loco and a rake of Auscision coaches consisting of an AE, AB, ABE and a brake.

David van der Linden brought his BGB kit of the SAR 800 class diesel loco. Mounted on a Proto 2000 chassis that was modified as required to fit under a body designed for an Athearn chassis.

Dane Filander has built four grain hoppers from scratch, painted in AN green and yellow with a little weathering thrown in. Dave Holmes displayed a couple of Dwf wagons and a Y wagon from End Of The Line Hobbies and a Model Etch Cf cattle wagon. Dave said he would much rather do another two hundred of the Cf wagons than the other seven of his Sf wagons. He also applauded the quality of the End Of The Line models but that might have been because Paul Collins was sitting nearby.

Paul Mackinnon brought along some of his Matchbox trains and a biscuit tin brought out by Big W at Christmas.

Paul Collins then talked about his display of tank wagons. He has prepared various kits with various diameter tanks to cater for all sorts of wagons, with the wagon made from injected styrene and polycarb tubes. The FB flats are part of the tanker project as there are many examples of tanks mounted onto converted FB wagons like the TDF. The FB flats feature brass etch sides complete with rivet detail and brass stanchions.

Hugh then showed a passenger train that is being donated to the Model Railway Club of Port Pirie. There were a couple of maroon and white coaches that used to be ROCO but are now Commonwealth Railways knock offs. A couple of Lima Indian Pacific coaches and a Loco.

News this month comes from TRIANG and, by the time that you read this, the equipment could be on sale in Adelaide.



According to '*The Model Railway News*' the car has a new power bogie, using metal strips in place of wiring. A horizontal shaft drives both bogie axles through brass worms and nylon gears. The car can be run singly or in multiple and non-powered cars can be purchased. All cars have interior seating.




March 18 Swapmeet

Guess what didn't happen at the January committee meeting? The membership fees, due on April 1st, didn't go up! Each year in January our financial situation is reviewed and the membership fees for the following year are set. The committee reviewed the situation and decided that, for this year, the fees would remain the same.

A good part of the reason for our healthy situation is that many of our members help out at our biannual (March & November) Swapmeets and at other events which make money for the club. So, lets see you bright and early (7am if you can make it) at Windsor Gardens Gym in a few days time on Sunday.



SARMA CLUB LAYOUT



This space would also be used as a work area for club projects, group meetings etc. Of course, General meetings will still be held in the Log Cabin. To this end, the layout's 3ft (1m) wide bench work will run to a length of 54'6" (16642mm), the building being 60ft x 23ft 7 inches (18275mm x 7200mm). Thus by shortening the previous plan by three ft six, all of the planning done before will not be wasted. The LH leg would be 22ft (6705.6mm) long ending in an approximately 84" (2m) diameter return loop, and at 8" (203mm) above this area would be one of the end stations of an end to end run, also hiding as well as the return loop, a hidden storage underneath. There would be a 2'6" (756mm) foot passage at the back of this leg for access to the storage under.

The RH leg would be 20 ft long leaving a 3 ft (914mm) isle also at the back for access to the fire exit door at that end and similarly to hidden storage, and again with a similar return loop and at 8" (203mm) above would be the other end station of an end to end run. The two return loops beneath the two end stations would give us three runs down the 54 ft six inch length and four times the runs down the legs giving a total run of 242 feet (74 metres) approx passing through three intermediate stations. We could spiral both end tracks down the return loops on a grade of 1.5% to join at 2.5 inch level creating a continuous run for the round and rounders of approx 320 feet.

This link could be used as dual track across the front. Nowhere on this plan does the track exceed a 2% grade or have a main track radius of less than 32".

The plan is to make the layout DCC and to this end we are purchasing a Lenz set 100 and booster amplifier that has never been used plus odds and ends from an interstate modeller via our good friends at End of Line Hobbies for a reasonable price.>>

SARMA CLUB LAYOUT (continued)

In the coming months serious planning will commence by people who can afford the time to work on this project, outside club meeting times. I make no apology for the use of feet and inch measurements as my brain still thinks that way and makes things easier when drawing plans. Since originally having to draw the plans by hand using a scale rule "T" square and pencil, a marvellous program had appeared called AnyRail that makes designing layouts a heck of a lot easier by preselecting your maximum grades, minimum radii, make and code of rails, points etc. This is accompanied by a draft plan of the clubroom layout with the bench space included.




They could have had a real shock; those third rails carry (from memory) about 600V dc. Ed.

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


Odds and Whatnots


FROM THE TRAINSPOTTING FILES



PICTURE COMPOSITION AND CROPPING EXAMPLES

Peter Pickering

As I mentioned last month, I will, from time to time, look at the effects of cropping options. With a bit of available space this month, here are the first couple.

The first is a picture that, apart from the arm in the bottom left corner, I was fairly happy with. The gorse at lower left (perhaps a bit distracting) starts a diagonal line of yellow almost to



top right. The locos are smoking nicely on the trestle and the train of bright red coaches fade away behind the light green trees. I had opted for the longer view, so the presence of other photographers was inevitable; I don't have a problem with that. Of course, if you're adept in the use of "paint" or other, more sophisticated tools, you could remove them. Alternatively, they could be cropped out; there is still plenty of greenery left to make a good picture.

There's little interest in the sky, so that could be reduced a little; the patch of grass in the right foreground is unexciting so most of that could go.

The difficult decision is if and how much to crop the sides. I rather liked the strappy leafed plant at right edge centre but I'd prefer to have the locos a bit



closer to the right edge of picture. the The left hand side is a little easier. There are several clumps of semi-transparent light trees green and one dark one which would make a nice terminal. However, I opted to leave in more gorse and more of the train. >>

PICTURE COMPOSITION AND CROPPING EXAMPLES (continued)

The original is rather cluttered; there are a couple of sheds (left edge right and edge) which don't contribute; the tour leader appears to be leaning on the back of the train; and that horrible witch's orange hat... The picture is obviously taken from the wrong position; five to ten paces to the left, and the witch's hat would have been clear of the water tower legs.



My first crop (as shown) was to cut out the sheds and the bottom of the witch's hat, leaving in most of the bushy tree on the left, the point lever and most of its base, the water tower legs and the trees behind. This was an improvement but the picture was still a bit cluttered. A further improvement would be to remove the witch's hat.

I then cropped out the remainder of the witch's hat and the posts behind the tour leader. I quite like this one. There's enough of the tour leader to see that he's an interested onlooker.

Cropping further, the tour leader could be cut out and the trees behind the water tower trimmed slightly. The picture is then completely devoid of a framing feature on the left edge which leaves it looking slightly naked.

An even further crop removes the pole showing above the first carriage. I didn't like this one because the picture that started out as the full train in the yard was reduced to barely more than the loco being watered, which wasn't what I wanted to achieve.

Maybe you would have left in the shed



to the right of the water tower. That would be completely up you, of to I find course. might that Ι crop something out, only to find that I put it back in. I left this shed out because I liked the water tower as а strong terminal.

Noel's Potterings Notes re pictures on following page

On the afternoon of Saturday 3 Feb.2012 the M.V.MINERVAGRACHT arrived at berth 29 Pt. Adelaide with the first 6 of an order of 10 new locos for Specialised Container Transport (SCT). The first to be unloaded was CSR 005, followed by CSR 003. Locos CSR 004, 006, 001 and 002 (in that order) were subsequently unloaded on Sunday, the 4th.

They were taken by low loader the short distance to the GWA railhead, placed on rail and hauled by SCT013 to the SCT facility at Penfield for final outfitting.

These locomotives are designated CSR (Model SDA1) after their Chinese origins and have a MTU power plant as used in American PT boat applications. They are rated at 4500HP with AC traction with the EPIC 3102 air brake system. ARTC proposed ATMS screens will be installed, along with FIRE (Functionally Integrated Railroad Equipment) screens and the new ICE (Integrated Control Equipment) screens.

The diesel has been purchased for the Port Pirie Club (by the Council), and the passenger carriages are, or will be, 4 Roco cars which our club is donating to Pirie, the cars having been painted Maroon with silver lines and decals for CR put on the sides. David Vander Linden and David Holmes also donated one IP car each. In all, 8 carriages fitted with KDs are being sent to Port Pirie which makes up into quite a reasonable train. The carriages also appear in 2 pics below.




