
Matt La Vista – A new model from Oxford Diecast in the form of a "Coopers Brewery" truck.



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
Fitting Replacement Lima Motors

Andrew Timmins

I thought for some members who, like me, may have several Lima locos with their original mechanisms and the cost to replace them with a better mechanism and chassis is cost prohibitive. The original mechanisms would rarely move at low speed and low power, and then as you slowly increase the power your loco suddenly disappears into the sunset! Help is possibly at hand; good replacement motors are available from EBAY; seller Oldmangordan or by contacting <u>bwmrbailey@yahoo.com.au</u>.

The motors come with detailed instructions and I found them helpful, however I didn't want to use super-glue in case a motor should fail; there's always one! So, I've detailed how I installed the motor into my NSW 4469 and NSW 42210. Some will ask why? My answer: At \$25 each for motor and gear, why not?

The tools and other things you need. Replacement motor, double sided foam tape, insulation



tape, screw drivers, soldering iron, Dremel or file, cutting blade and ruler.

First, test the new motor before installation. Common sense! Remove the body from the chassis and place it somewhere safe away from the work area, but not so safe that you can't find it again! Modeller's time warp! Disconnect wires to motor and pick-ups.


Remove the power bogic from the chassis, by unscrewing the 2 screws on the underside of the bogic. Lift out the motor and gearing frame; put the side frame and screws in container for later.

Remove the motor by unscrewing the 2 screws on the holding plate to free the brushes, springs, rotor and round magnet. Getting the magnet out of the motor bay can be an effort, depending on how strong the magnet is. For me, one was easy and the other, after the use of a few choice words, it was seen flying off into the Modeler's Time warp to be found 2 days later by accident.

The picture, left, shows the disassembled motor

The new motor is smaller than the motor bay, but too large if the magnet were to remain in place. So how to fill the space? The foam double sided tape comes to the rescue. Cut the tape into 2 strips $80 \text{mm} \ge 6.5 \text{mm}$ wide and 1 strip $90 \text{mm} \ge 6.5 \text{mm}$.

Wrap the leading edge of the motor casing, parallel to front face, with the strips. Be careful not to cover the wires, and cut the ends of the layer so they are flush. Remove the paper and




repeat with the 2nd layer. The 3rd layer, however **leave** the paper on and test fit into the bogie. It is a snug fit, so don't remove the paper, unless you want to have a fight getting it out and you will reduce the adhesive. Common sense!

I found putting the bottom edge of the casing over the centre axle first, was easier when installing the motor.

The wheels and gears should now rotate easily with little effort or restriction when pushed across the mat.

You will see on the 3 axle bogie, the middle axle just touches the motor casing. If I didn't have either the 3 axle bogie or the pizza cutters wheels then I probably wouldn't need to do the next bit! But I did!





Remove the motor, **remember paper protects**, and grind/file away part of the casing, I used a Dremel with a grinding bit @ 8000 rpm. I wanted maximum control with no other damage.


The area, ground away was about 7mm long x 6mm wide, (touched the tape), x 1.5mm depth, (just so cracks begin forming on the thinning metal casing).

Cut a strip of insulation tape, 10mm x 6mm and attach to the ground area to insulate and protect the casing from possible wheel strike.

Again, test fit the motor back into the bogie, so that the wheels are free of the casing. When you're happy with the fit, remove the motor to remove the paper. Common sense. Then install and pressing into place, ensure that the wheels and gears are engaging and rotating easily; oil as you go.

Install the bogie and side frames back into the chassis. Reconnect the wires to the motor and pickups and/or DCC chip. Reattach the body and you're finished for your loco to run on your DC or DCC layout.

I have found the motor control at low speed very good and the pulling power has also increased. As I mentioned before, the next thing is to either replace, grind or turn down the pizza cutter wheels. ■


SAR in Queensland N° 3


It's been four years since I began my small layout here in Brisbane. It's nearly finished now, apart from scenery detail. Also getting two turntables operating. And possibly getting around to installing signals, and lights in buildings.

Point Motor Switches

I decided not to have a central control panel, but to put switches near the points, as on the club's old exhibition layout, using this process:

- I drew the track plan on some 1 mm styrene sheet, and marked the location of the push-button switches. I then screwed the styrene sheet to the fascia of the layout.
- I drilled 2 mm pilot holes for the switches, using Peter Pickering's Patented Perpendicular Procedure to line up the drill. (See The Buffer Stop, Sept 2009, page 15).
- Then I removed the styrene sheet, and (a) drilled a hole through the fascia to take the body of the switch, and (b) drilled a smaller hole through the styrene sheet to take the top of the switch.
- Finally, I replaced the styrene sheet onto the fascia and installed the switches.








Scenery Base

I've found that fibreglass flywire makes a good base for scenery. It seems to take up natural-looking contours.

- In a craft shop I found plasterimpregnated cloth. I cut it into strips about 6" x 1", soaked them in water, and applied them over the flywire base.
- Then I applied soupy-thick plaster over the strips (spraying them wet again first or the plaster dries and stalls on the spot) and added rocks cast from rock moulds.
- I painted the rock faces using very much diluted acrylic paints from a craft shop.



Murphy Strikes Again

The layout isn't quite finished, and already I have found problems.

- Some locos started to derail at a module join. A couple of attempted fixes didn't work, and I had to replace the track and the ballast on both sides of the join.
- A Powerline 830 has less than ideal pickups: one rail from one bogie, and the other rail from the other bogie. My 830 stalled on a 3-way point, because one of the Peco switches underneath was playing up. I had to remove a tunnel cover to get to it and spray it with RP-7, which eventually got it working again. I salvaged a fair bit of stuff from my layout in Adelaide including track, points and point motors, most of which have been trouble-free. But I discovered early on that the Peco switches that fit underneath the point motors caused so much trouble that I replaced them with new ones.
- While I was working on the points, my grand-daughter was driving a 930 around the lower level of the layout. It stalled at the entrance to a dead-end siding. A check with a multimeter showed that one rail now had no electrical connection to it. It was connected to the next rail with a metal joiner, and also there was a dropper wire soldered to it, and both had failed. Relocating and re-soldering the dropper has solved that one.

The Woes of Queensland Rail

QR has a new CEO to try to solve its problems, which aren't going away. He used to run Melbourne Ports and hasn't run a railway before.

There is an order for 75 new suburban electric train costing \$4.4 billion (that's \$59 million for each 6car set). The order was placed by the previous government with a consortium involving Bombardier, and everyone assumed that they would be built by Bombardier and EDI at Maryborough. But they are being built in India. Thirteen sets have been delivered and the Government has ordered a halt to further deliveries and refused to make any payments until problems are fixed.

Some have been delivered with tonnes of parts still to be installed.

They have a problem with uneven braking.

Air conditioning and ventilation are not adequate.

Both the driver's seating position and the position of controls have to be moved.

The doorways between carriages do not meet Australian standards: they are too narrow for wheelchairs.

All the platforms at 143 stations in the metropolitan network must have new stop markers installed because of sighting problems from the driver's cab.

At Cairns, the most senior driver in the far north has been suspended after being charged by the police with masterminding a marijuana trafficking network following an investigation that began in 2014. In early March he was due to conduct an internal QR Code of Conduct review on his fellow train drivers, which includes mouth swab drug tests and signing a strict "no drugs" policy.

The shortage of drivers on the metropolitan services will last two more years. New timetables are in place, giving fewer services than a year ago. There are predictions already of problems when the Commonwealth Games are held on the Gold Coast next year. At least, drivers from other systems are now being allowed to apply; previously, applications were considered only from existing QR employees.

Since October, QR has spent \$10.4 million in driver overtime, and \$4.2 million on replacement buses and taxis for stranded passengers. The CEO who quit got a \$160,000 severance payment. Experts are working out how to reduce the 18 month driver training time to 9 months. Experienced drivers from elsewhere are still having their applications held up. The Commonwealth Games will be held at the Gold Coast next year, and additional rail transport is vital to their success.

29th Swapmeet Report for March 2017

There were 27 traders, amounting to 48 tables, including eventually, 4 commission tables.

As 2 of 3 newcomers cancelled at the last minute, one of those tables was used for commission sales, the other was given to another newcomer at cost. Attendance by the public amounted to 235, which seems to be a little above average.

Unusually, bookings for trading tables were way down from our last event of 63 tables. At least 4 of our regulars, who usually use 10 tables between them, had or were waiting for medical operations. Other regulars did not give a reason for absence. The set-up this time, with the usual 28 tables around the edge, reverted back to a large rectangle of other tables along the centre of the hall. This plan can only accommodate 50 tables.

Again, results of where people had seen the event advertised were compiled by Matt conducting another survey, with flyers being the most effective in shops and other swap meets. Peter P's efforts of putting road signs in the area resulted in 11 in the survey. A sheet showing more details should be available at the next meeting.

We advertised in 2 editions of the Saturday Advertiser before the event, with the usual flyers in at least 18 hobby/toy shops and two websites. Tony Sitters kindly arranged for the event to be mentioned on a local radio station. Our thanks go to him once again.

I would like to thank PeterP for his help with preparations and in arranging the date with the school and placing corflute signs in the local area. Also Gordon for acquiring the keys and unlocking and securing the premises after the event.

Also, using our revised distribution of name tags, thanks go to Richard Ash for checking in every 'trader' against bookings. In the past, people have wandered in and taken tags off the tables and worn them to avoid being challenged, instead of waiting until 10am when the public pay to be admitted. Also thanks to Matt for doing the survey and other members managing the commission tables, also the Barnes team out the front for providing their ever popular sausage sizzle. Not forgetting members selling tickets. Thanks also to members for their assistance with flyer delivery, table set-up/clearing up, parking/unloading and help on the "commission sales" tables.

Again, my thanks to all members involved which, as mentioned above, helps to make our event one of, if not, the best.

I might add that we run this event on a formal booking, where signed application forms have to be completed with acceptance of the rules. Full payment is required 2 weeks before the event, with a late fee after the due date, as the floor plan has to drawn up and tables hired in advance.

(Most other events of this nature take verbal bookings and payment on the day of the event). Which I have observed, is open to abuse.

The next swap meet is planned for 17th September 2017. ■


