# N SCALE CLUBROOM LAYOUT CONSTRUCTION BEGINS Matt LaVista

The SARMA N scale division has undergone another rebirth, this time with a permanent club layout being constructed. Before construction of the library commenced it was originally planned to bring the old 'Barrie Valley Railway' exhibition layout back into the old shed to live out its retirement as this purpose. However, at 7 metres long, it neatly blocked up the library door and was too old to be easily reconstructed to fit the available space. (Said layout now resides with Colin Barnes).

The plan below shows the current layout under construction. Basically a distorted 'U', the new setup allows plenty of running track with sidings to allow two main lines with a branch for industrial style shunting. To give the largest possible curves on the balloon loops to allow for long radius trains to be run, the curves have been made 20 inch radius on the main. The layout will be 'split' scenically with the possibility of multi-level operation. It is pleasing to note that the legs we use have come from the old

Islington layout so a little bit of SARMA history lives on.


So we can easily accommodate both DC and DCC; the layout will be wired to make the power easily interchangeable between the two control systems.

In order to ensure that work proceeds briskly but is not interrupted, the N scale Exhibition layout will be withdrawn from operation for the whole of 2018, with the exception of the 'Kemptown' U-Drive. For 2019, a new T-TRAK layout will be constructed using some existing modules as the current 'Rails to Morgan Wharf' layout is due for a revamp.

Currently a team, including a number of the HO modellers, are hard at work and by the time you read this in the November issue, the baseboards should be completed. We are most gratified for these gentlemen getting stuck in. All SARMA members who might be interested in helping out are most welcome whether you model N scale or not.

No decision has been made on scenery setting yet (we would like to have all track laid and fully operational first!) though it is my preference to make a layout in the style of the 'BVR'- filled with fun little cameos and scenes. Remember the cheese rolling or the smoking shed? Perhaps we can even make a line for the toilet longer than our first attempt!!

# South of the Border ...

Right in the middle of preparations for this copy of Buffer Stop, I took a week off to go to the British Railway Modellers Convention in Melbourne - Box Hill to be precise. I went with a couple of cohorts from BRMA who happen to also interest South have an in Australian railways. We took a couple of extra days to ride some Victorian heritage lines and look at a few model shops. I won't bore you with anv details of the convention, but you might just find some of my other photos of slight interest.

The Goldfields Railway runs on Wednesdays and weekends so we drove to Maldon on the Tuesday and stayed in the only motel overnight. On the way over, we paused somewhere between Tailem Bend and Keith (probably Coonalpyn) and took a couple of photos of the silos. Three hours later (don't know where) we came across a trio of light engines (BL33, 8124, X50) travelling quickly in the opposite direction. Moving on to Ararat, we turned left towards Avoca and Maryborough. Alongside much of this road there was a lot of activity on the railway line. Stopping briefly in Avoca (I think), we sought out a shop window containing pieces of the Vulcan Vale Narrow Gauge Railway which was featured in AMRM some years ago - photos here and overleaf.

# **Tailem Bend Depot Work Days: Updates and Explanation**

**S** ince our initial work day in July we have had two more sessions, late August and one recently in mid-October (September was a no go given the enormously busy schedule). With a crew varying in numbers between eight and fifteen our group has carved a swathe across the former Roundhouse depot, doing badly needed duties such as weedkilling, mowing, stump and rubbish removal as well as scrubbing carriage stock clean of graffiti.

Thanks to our efforts in catching up on the maintenance, the boys of Nullarbor Rail (owners of the former *Murraylander* and other rolling stock in the depot) have been able to concentrate their work upon restoring their carriages and locomotives to rolling order. There have been dramatic leaps and bounds. Former NSW 45 Class rebuilt with a low nose, no. 103, is now operational. Track work to house the loco safely in a shed has now been completed and by the time you read this, the engine should be in its new home, much safer than out in the open where vandals can attack it.

I have been asked why we go up there and what the benefit to SARMA is. Since our bus trip to the depot in 2014 I had kept in touch occasionally with Steve Moritz and noted the continued problems besetting them. A lot of negativity has been spread about the Tailem Bend group by people who have no idea what they are talking about, particularly in regards to 'Letting the 900s rot'. For those who have read my book on said locos, you can read for yourself just how much money was expended and subsequently wasted thanks to the thoughtless actions of the scum who have caused so much damage. For those who haven't the figure runs to nearly a quarter of a million dollars on 909 *alone*. That is not including all the work on the carriage stock or acquiring other locomotives such as the TL class which have also been thus attacked.

I made the decision to see if the group would be open to SARMA members or others under our invitation give them a hand doing something, *anything* useful that might help them get back into gear again. I am delighted to say our work has been received with much gratitude. After just three sessions we have already made a noticeable difference and no doubt improved the morale of all the Tailem group knowing that people genuinely care and wish to help. It also fills you with pride to see people like Dane Filander getting stuck in on track work, Jeremy Kemp scrub cutting and Hugh Williams the Magic Mower Man in action.

When the carriage stock and accreditation is sorted trains will begin to be run as soon as possible. This will be the first Standard Gauge tourist train on the tracks since the SG Bluebird operations were killed off thanks to the Liability Crisis. The initial aim is to run out of Keswick to Tailem Bend for the motorsport operations but also to other destinations on the ARTC network.

For the SARMA members and others who have helped out there is a reward waiting in store. When the trains start running a special 'Volunteers' Carriage solely for those intrepid helpers will be attached for their enjoyment.

If you are interested, all you need is a pair of hands and a willingness to do something! We have equipment such as sprayers and graffiti removal and people with gear such as whippersnippers, mowers or high pressure sprayers bring those up with them. There is no 'structure' to the work days- you will *not* be ordered about or made to do something you really don't want to. We find out beforehand what jobs need to be done and figure out who would like to work on what.

While you are there you can have a close look at the interested variety of stock, be it ex Pullman Car 'Mt Lofty' or Commonwealth IP Dining Cars. Once 909s bogies are returned from Victoria the locomotive will be craned on to them and railed on the Standard Gauge to be finished off. Our helpers will get a *first hand* look at this process!

So please, keep your ear out for announcements of the next work days (will most likely be on Sundays in the future owing to my new job working Saturdays!) and consider coming up to help make the final push and get the trains running. ■





Terry Meads was made a life member this year and it was well earned. Terry has organised many successful Swap meets over the years and this has brought in many thousands of dollars




