




Peter Pickering explains how to keep your locos running well.


If you find that your locos are not running as well as they should, perhaps they just need some maintenance to get them back on track. Our Honourable Editor asked if anyone could write an article for service of rolling stock, and by luck the three locos from the Royal Show were requiring service due to poor running so I volunteered.

Firstly, you will need some essential tools.

A foam rubber block 90mm x 40mm x 200mm with a "V" cut into its length with a sharp modelling knife (see photo) to support the rolling stock;

small Phillips head and straight blade screwdrivers and small pliers;


a bottle of Faller™ oil - this comes with a very small tube in its lid that requires you to squeeze the bottle to get a drop of oil, so that you can't overdo it; an NMRA wheel gauge.





Wheel Cleaning

It is handy for cleaning wheels if you have a Dremel or modelling drill with a wire brush attachment, if not a small amount of P1500 grade wet and dry paper can be wrapped around a small flat screw driver, and you will need to power the loco so that the wheels turn. (see photos). I use a DC power supply with clip leads. When the wheels have been polished it's a good thing to check the wheel spacing with a NMRA gauge if you have one. If not, remove some wheels from two different pieces of rolling stock. If the flanges have the same spacing as each other, then there is a good chance they are in gauge. Then use them to check the loco flange spacing. One of the Royal Show locos was reported as derailing and was out of gauge as seen in the photos. This was eased back into gauge. If you cannot get the wheels back in gauge you will have to remove the axle from the bogie as described next page.








Wheel removal

First remove the side frame assembly by prising it out from the eight lugs indicated, do 4 on one side, it makes it easier. This exposes the three axles; lift out the out of gauge one and adjust it. If it is loose on the gear see if the gear is split. If so you may have to try the manufacturer for a new one; if not, clean the axle


and gear in metho, put a small amount of silicone sealant in the hole wipe off excess adjust gauge and let dry. Fit the axle in the position that is closest to the centre of the loco but first remove the idler gear between it and the centre axle. The bogie then becomes 4-wheel drive instead of 6. This gear problem is prevalent in the 930 class model so this may work for you.




Lubrication

Wheel bearings in most production steam and diesels are phosphor bronze (see photo) and it is debateable if they require lubricating oil, but a small drop from that Fallers™ oil bottle may not hurt. Having said that, most manufacturers use a spilt axle/gear arrangement to isolate the wheels and use the wheels and bogie frame for electrical pickup, and I have come across instances where the lubricant used by a manufacturer was nonconductive resulting in erratic running of the loco due to intermittent pickup. The remedy was to strip out all axles and wash each axle and bearing block with metho, but not the gears which should have grease on them. Incidentally, as the loco ages the grease might get hard, in which case the bogies will need to be taken out by unclipping the worm gear housing and pulling apart as described above, washed in metho, and re-greased with a modelling gear grease. In the case of steam locos, the same applies for the

drive wheel axles but also the side rods slide bars piston rods, pony trucks and tender wheels.




The most important part of this exercise is to lubricate the motor bearings as this can be the cause of slow running, and in the case of DCC, causing the decoder to shut down spasmodically due to overheating. First remove the body, due to the many variations in manufacturers products especially steam locos, all cannot be described here hopefully you have kept the instructions if not try Google™, but I will use the Showgrounds Austrains™ CLP's to demonstrate. Using your foam support remove the front and rear couplers, pull out the body sides and ease the chassis out, put the body aside.



As you can see in the above photo, in this case the motor is mounted inside the weight. Remove the four screws indicated including, in this case, the screw holding the rear coupler, and lift the weight high enough to expose the motor bearings. With your Fallers $^{\text{TM}}$ oil bottle, squeeze a drop of oil on both bearings turn the flywheels to let the oil run into the bearing; also put a drop on the four bearings of the gear tower.


While in this case the wiring is exposed, check the connections to the bogie frames; if they are not soldered do so. I have seen many cases of non-existent electrical contact between the lugs and wire, hence very poor running.

If you look at the small plug-in board on the mother board, there are six wires connected to it; I have soldered four of them but I have left two as they were supplied; they are just plastic cups creating a pressure connection to the wire. This in time can cause a poor connection. I soldered the other two that were the motor connections later. This small board is used for a DCC chip plug-in point; more on this later.




Couplers


There are several types but the most prevalent on American and Australian rollingstock Kadee. These must be at a common height on all rolling stock in your hoard and any other person's rolling stock if they are going to run together reliably. The best way is to use the proper Kadee gauge - see picture. They don't cost much but you can possibly borrow one. The gauge clips onto the rail and the rollingstock should mate exactly. (see photo)



DCC Decoders

Because mention was made earlier in this article of the plug on the mother board of the CLP that used to install a Decoder, it might be an idea if you are thinking of installing DCC in your locos to do it now. The more recently manufactured locos will have a DCC ready socket with dummy plugs or sockets installed as can be seen in the CLP, some 8pin and some 21pin.





As can be seen in the picture above, the 8pin decoder plug has been plugged into the socket removed from the mother board which can now be discarded. What can't be seen in the black and white photo is that the pin that has the red wire of the decoder is plugged into the socket that has a red wire from the righthand side of the bogies. Unfortunately, manufacturers tended to choose any colour they felt like in the past, so to make sure, look at the loco. If you were sitting in the RH seat of the cab, the wire coming from that side of the loco is the one that goes to the red wire of the decoder. Also, the mother board used to drop the voltage to the front and rear headlights so a 1000 ohm resistor **must** be inserted into common of the lights circuit that the blue wire of the decoder supplies. For locos that are not fitted with sockets the decoder will have to be hard wired. You will have to be ok with soldering small parts; if not, as soon as we reintroduce dedicated modelling nights again, bring you models along; someone will help I am sure. The colour code of the decoder is this: RED wire of the decoder to the RHS of loco, BLACK wire of the decoder to the LHS of loco, ORANGE wire of the decoder to the Motor wire that was attached to the RHS of the loco, GREY wire of the decoder to the Motor wire that was attached to the RHS of the decoder to the common wire of the front and rear Lights, if they are LEDs insert a 1000ohm resistor, White wire to the front light, Yellow wire to the rear light; done!

A DCC equipped loco will run on DC no worries!

Remember a clean oiled engine is a happy engine. ■

The electrical/electronics on the layout has progressed, thanks to Graham and Trevor, to the stage that only Burford Junction is to be completed.


Burford Junction Key block switch panel has been installed and is working fine.



David Jammo and Kelvin have completed the panels on the Southend Station leaving only Burford to make -



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47th AMRA Model Train Exhibition 26-27/8/2017 John Henderson


